

Learning guide: Using a keyboard

This session is a blend of online learning using Learn My Way and offline practise activities.

Learn

- What a keyboard is for.
- The different keys (letters, numbers, space, enter, delete and shift).
- Keys that have more than one use.
- Why you would press two keys at once.
- How to use the keyboard to type letters, numbers and extended characters.

Do

- Have Learn My Way open on the computer.
- Navigate to the Learn My Way subject Using your device.
- Complete the topic Basics of using a keyboard
- Complete Practise activity 1 and Practise activity 2. Discuss the outcome with your tutor.
- Complete the topic Advanced keyboard functions.

Practise activity 2

Type the following text from 'Alice in Wonderland':
